Memorial Day 2012 Carl Boucher Wilson 2-22-1922 to 8-8-2010 By: Ed Wilson



The family of Carl B. Wilson would like to thank the Parkman Township Trustees for remembering and honoring our beloved husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather.

Carl was born on February 22, 1922, in Nelson Ohio. The only boy with five sisters, Carl moved when he was fifteen to a farm on Nash Road in Parkman Township.

At the age of twenty and a draft notice for the Army in the mailbox his buddy Bill Wilthew (who was home on leave from the Navy) talked him into joining the Navy on October 14, 1942. Few people knew that Dad was not a good swimmer

and could only doggy paddle but it was enough to get him into the Navy.

Basic Training took place at the Great Lakes Training Facility in Illinois. Dad was assigned to serve on submarines after Basic's, but was disqualified due to being claustrophobic. He then went to gunner's school in Gulfport Mississippi. After he graduated from gunner's school he was assigned to being a gunner on merchant ships based out of New York. The Navy placed guns and gun crews to defend against air attacks on commercial ships during World War II.

Making 10 conveys across the Atlantic Ocean delivering military supplies from the United States to various ports in Europe and North Africa. On each convoy he and his crew where

on a different ship. On one convey he witnessed the ship in front of him strike a mine and sink. During the end of the war his ship transported German POW's from Italy to England and to the United States.

Carl was honorably discharged on October 5, 1945 at the rank of Gunners Mate 2nd Class, he returned to Parkman to his wife and one year old daughter.

Carl married Betty Hopkins, also a resident of Parkman Township. They married in her family home, across from the Parkman Community House the old Sitko house, on October 18, 1943.

Carl and Betty purchased land at the corner of US 422 and Reynolds Road in 1947 where Betty currently lives and where they raised three children, Judy, Jim and Ed.





Carl worked as a welder at Silica Sands outside of Garrettsville for four years upon his return from serving his country. He then worked as a welder for Taylor Winfield in Warren Ohio for 33 years.

Carl retired in 1984 and enjoyed his retirement by going to swap meets, selling and buying items throughout northeast Ohio and growing different types of flowers in the summer. He served on Parkman's zoning board and the zoning board of appeals. Carl and Betty are long time members of Parkman Congregational Church.

Carl had one son (Ed) who continued on the tradition of serving his country in the US Air force. He also has two grandsons currently serving in the US Army, Kristopher and Kevin Wilson both have had several tours of duty to Iraq and Afghanistan.

The family remembers Dad putting on his Navy uniform proudly and marching in this very parade. According to Dad each year the uniform shrank more and more while hanging in the closet.

The photo on the cover and to the right are both with Carl leading the Parkman Parade in the 1960's If you notice, the parade route began from Lower Cemetery and ended up at Overlook back then.
