Overlook hosts purchases including the pavilion with a

fire place, picnic tables with wheelchair accessibility and baby seats, and the various entertainment like two baseball diamonds, tennis courts (that convert into an ice skating ring in the winter), horseshoe pits and playground. Support for these were from grants and monies raised from fundraisers through the Parkman Chamber of Commerce. # **Gates Family History**

At the May 2007 meeting, Mark Dolezal introduced our guest speaker, Rich Gates. The Gates family has traced ancestors to New York State. The family were all farmers. The first residence was the Puck place on Farmington Road (now the Schloss rental house). They then moved to the first farm on left side of Nash Road in Troy Township. The farm was sold in 1946-1948. Rich's brother, Dale attended Parkman School in 1947 when they lived at the point of Hosmer Road and Rt. 528. This home was originally a church. The family then moved to Grove Road near Mumford. Gates Construction started in Middlefield on Button Avenue with three or four houses. Then they built three or four in Parkman and then on to Lake Lucerne in Chesterland. In 1959 or 1960 they bought the bottom half of the Grand River from the Electric Company (200 to 300 acres) and the top half was purchased by the Moss'. Later the Gates' purchased the Hoxter farm which squared up the property lines.

Thank you Mr. Gates for sharing your family history with the community.

# Parkman Trustees Notes

Please note this important date:

**Monday, August 27<sup>th</sup>, 7 p.m. at the Community House** for the final Water Resources Department meeting about **sewer tie-in**. Fees, who can tie-in, who can do the trenching and when this can happen are major points that will be addressed, as well as finalized costs.

Use of Overlook Park must be scheduled with Wendy Anderson 548-2388. Use of the pavilion and park are free to township residents. For out-of-township organizations, a fee of \$100 will be charged.

If we get some much needed rain, the Trustees have arranged for an Infinitree seedling to be planted at Overlook Cemetery, in the corner where our Eagle Scouts built benches and a trash receptacle for their community project. The location affords a wonderful peaceful spot. The Infinitree project was a Geauga Bicentennial joint project resulting in some wonderful art work displayed at the West Woods and subsequently auctioned off. Other County organizations have participated in the sapling planting.

The Trustees have had many calls about the dust in the dry weather. The spraying has been done intermittently at best, as it is available. It is a short term solution. The Trustees are putting another Road and Bridges 1.5 mill levy on the November ballot. **That levy needs to pass**. We have already begun cost cutting measures to keep the Township solvent through 2008.

Hobart Road and the ODOT project have caused much concern in the community. The ODOT representative for the project and the Karvo Company manager office is at the old Parkman Video. A traffic-speed study was done on Hobart by our County Engineer. The average speed was clocked at 40 mph. Orange (suggested speed) signs are posted for 35 mph and a four-way stop signs at Reynolds and Hobart are installed. Please understand that your Trustees must follow the rules for speed postings and signage during this next year and a half.

The Cardinal Board of Education has decided to rent out the Parkman School to help divert the costs of upkeep. The school is zoned and available to be used as a commercial facility. If you have an interest in renting this property, please contact Lucinda Sharp Gates for details or come to a Trustees meeting.



# **Residential Property Tax Relief for age 65+ or Disabled**

Geauga County Auditor Tracy Jemison announced Operation Tax Relief is now in effect until October 1, 2007. The State of Ohio adopted a new and expended Homestead Exemption for all homeowners that are 65 years or older and/or permanently disabled, regardless of income. Jemison encourages everyone who are eligible to apply for the Tax Credit. # Summer 2007 Feature Volunteer Profile William Snyder - Past Fire Chief



William Snyder was born in Youngstown on July 18th, 1927. Bill worked for Standard Oil until he entered the US Military service and served as a medic in the Pacific. After serving our country, he continued working for Standard Oil. Bill married Charlotte in 1947. Together they had 4 children, Danny, twins Sandie and Cindy, and Scott. Sandie (Parnaby) also serves the Parkman Rescue Team.

In 1951, Bill moved to Parkman and opened up a Standard Oil Service Station. He owned and operated the station from Feb. 1951 to '68. Bill also owned and operated Ashland fuel in Burton from 1968 to '88. He was also a bus mechanic for Newberry Schools for 14 years until he was 80 years old, retiring in 2003.

Bill joined the Parkman Fire Department in 1951. The first picture on the left is of Bill in a jeep that he built ,which was Parkman's first Grass Truck...a modified 4x4 that had a water tank and hoses to help put out grass fires in hard to reach areas in our community. Bill served as Fire Chief from 1955-1959. He also served ad Assistant Chief 1960-62.

As a fundraiser, Parkman Fire Department used to host Fish Fries. The second picture from the left is of Bill tackling the grease splatter and frying up a delicious meal.
