Parkman Trustees Notes

From: Lucinda Sharp Gates

Even after a re-count on the Roads and Bridges levy following the close results of the November election, the result remained the same304 to 305 against! We needed the recount to produce two more votes. As a result of yet another defeat we have put the 1.5 mill levy back on the ballot for the Primary election on March 4th.

We will continue in our efforts to conserve our monetary resources in maintaining the roads. This is a difficult season with the freeze/thaw cycle and with Tom's knowledge and help we will do what is feasible for the season and conditions.

Your trustees hired extra Sheriff's Department patrolling specifically for the Hobart Road area to try to keep some of the traffic problems under control. We are hoping to continue that project over the next several months to make the road safer for Township residents.

We know that traffic has increased on Old State Road also because of the 422 project. We understand that that westbound 422 project may be completed by October of this year rather than the November completion date. Pat Joyce has been communicating with ODOT and Karvo to improve communications with our residents along that corridor.

Amish schools in Geauga County get books special delivery

Volunteers with Geauga's Bookmobile open the literary world to more than 1,300 Amish children every month, delivering crates of books to schoolhouses scattered around Geauga County. The Amish Book Program essentially serves as a rotating library shared by those rural schools. The project, coordinated by the Geauga Public Library, serves 32 Amish schools. Only a few don't participate.

Money from a federal grant targeting young readers helped launch the program in the mid-1980s. Once a month, each school receives four crates holding roughly 100 books. The volunteers take back crates left the previous month, which then flow to a different group of students. The program circulates more than 7,000 books, all checked out on library cards assigned to each school.

The library uses a special collection of books to ensure they mesh with Amish tastes and values. Volunteers often return with requests.

Progress Meeting for the U.S. 422 Construction Project

(Continued from Page 1)

- 2. Here are the following requirements for maintaining traffic during Phase II per Item 614:
 - a. Westbound U.S. 422 and Main Market Road traffic to remain detoured as per Phase I.
 - b. Close Reynolds Road to thru traffic and detour traffic to Hobart Road. (This will mainly affect Southbound Traffic that had been using Reynolds Road to access U.S. 422. ODOT advised the traffic impact would be monitored. Eastbound U.S. 422 traffic to one lane and shift to the new outside eastbound lane constructed in Phase I.
 - c. Bi-directional traffic on the permanent lanes has now been implemented on S.R. 282.
 - d. Construct the center turn lane and two westbound lanes on U.S. 422. Remove the crossover constructed in Phase I.
 - e. Construct the Proposed Reynolds Road pavement.
 - f. Removal of the temporary pavement on the East side of S.R. 282, some ditch work, and landscaping, and other minor details will be completed later this year.
 - g. Access to drives shall be maintained at all times.
- 3. ODOT advised Karvo Paving to address damage claims by Parkman Township Residents.

Parkman Township asked that Karvo Paving do a better job of communicating with both its residents and its Fire Department during Phase II than it did in Phase I. Preferably in writing. (As a side note, State Senator Grendell is aware of the many issues our residents had during Phase I of the project. Steps are being taken to address these issues and hopefully prevent future ones.)



Parkman Volunteer Fire From: Assistant Chief Chuck Dillon



The Parkman Fire Department took delivery of our new HME pumper the first week of December. We have spent many hours training drivers/pump operators, and transferring/ mounting equipment. We have been purchasing necessary accessories with funds raised by the volunteers---not tax levy monies. The Trustees were able to purchase this much-needed truck by being frugal with our fire funds. As you all know, Northern Ohio winters are not kind to vehicles. The monies for the truck were set aside over a period of years, which saved \$10,000 for a cash payment instead of financing. We received \$30,000 trade for the old pumper, which is nearly 10 times more than we ever got for any of our old trucks. Actual cost of the new truck was about \$260,000. Fire fund monies cannot be used for any other purpose by law. Several new pumpers have been purchased in Geauga and Portage Counties in the last year. I believe ours is the least expensive. I've been in the PTVFD for nearly 43 years and it's not 1965 anymore, folks. NFPA mandates make expensive trucks MORE expensive. Stop in any Wednesday evening and take a look at it.

On Thursday, January 17th, we finally took delivery of our long awaited LifePak 12. This is the new heart monitor we ordered last March for \$15,177 (including trade-in). It is far superior to our old unit and capable of transmitting heart information to the hospital in real time. Most of the cost is covered by generous donations from our residents in memory of their loved ones. More next newsletter. Remember to keep your chimney cleaned.

Recently, Ohio law makers have made a change to zoning laws that, for the most part exempt oil and gas well drilling companies from local zoning resolutions. These companies are regulated still by the state, but not local zoning.
