# **TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES' NOTES** (continued from page 1)

The plans for rebuilding Route 422 are in the final stages. Stage 3, or final stage review, will be in March. Property right of way negotiations will begin soon and are to be completed by May of 2006. The State will open bids for the project in January of 2007. Construction is slated to begin in the spring of 2007 with the hope of completion of the project by the summer of 2008.

The Geauga County Water Management Department sent the specifications to contractors for bids at the end of December 2004 for the Parkman Sewer District. The bids were opened, but all were rejected. New bids will be opened the end of March. Construction should begin in early summer and is slated to be completed by early summer 2006. Residents will tie into the new system from that point until December 2006.

The Parkman Board of Trustees will have to take into consideration the potential planned growth and beneficial development that will be made possible in the township because of the new sewer district. Our current zoning resolution will have to be updated to plan for new business opportunities that will be made possible by the addition of sewers in Parkman. You are welcome to attend future zoning commission meetings on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of each month at 7:00pm, if you desire to have input into the changes made to the zoning resolution.

We have seen many weather changes this winter. The gravel roads require much attention with these changes. Our road department will continue to maintain the roads as needed. We appreciate your understanding. Please call us with any problems or concerns with our township roads. The Parkman Township Board of Trustees welcomes the residents of Parkman to contact us with their concerns about the township or attend the trustees meetings so that you can be informed and involved.



The next meeting of the trustees will not be on Tuesday, March 1. It has been **rescheduled for MON-DAY, March 7**. The Trustees will return to their normal meeting schedule for their March 15 meeting.

#### ROAD DEPARTMENT RUMBLINGS

The Township Trustees have adopted the County Engineer's Revised Policy on Driveway Permits, as well as the County's Mailbox Installation Policy. The Laws of the State of Ohio provide for the removal of obstructions within the right-of-way. Here are the rules for mailboxes:


- 1. The mailbox unit shall be entirely of plastic and/or lightweight galvanized steel construction. Newspaper delivery boxes shall be of the same type of construction and of minimum dimensions suitable for holding newspapers.
- 2. The post shall be a single 4" x 4" diameter wooden post or a metal post no greater than 2" in diameter and no more than 24" into the ground. Mailbox supports shall *not* be set in concrete *or be permanently affixed in any manner*.
- 3. Multiple mailbox units of more than two boxes may not be mounted on one support.
- 4. The door of the mailbox shall be placed a minimum of 4" outside the shoulder portion of the highway. When a mailbox is installed in the vicinity of existing guard rail, it shall be placed behind the guard rail unless otherwise approved by the Geauga County Engineer.

#### THE POSTAL SCENE

There's nothing like a colorful marine aquarium to bring the amazing aquatic world of reefs, plants and animals to the surface. Or an excursion through the desert to explore the diverse world of creatures thriving in hot, dry climates. That's right, stamps take you on "eco-cruises" through our Earth's radically different ecological communities. Stamps offer us insight into the major cultural trends and inventions of the 20th century through the Celebrate the Century program.

Plus they honor the artists and authors who shaped our vision of the future. You'll find the pulse of our great country living in the large collection of postal stamps. Stamp collecting can be a lifelong fun and educational hobby for all ages. It's a great hobby for kids. It's easy to start your own collection without a big investment.

You can start by simply saving stamps from letters, packages and postcards. Ask your friends and family to save stamps from their mail. Neighborhood businesses that get a lot of mail - banks, stores, travel agencies - might save their envelopes for you, too. Or, start your collection by choosing one or two favorite subjects. Then, collect only stamps that fit your theme - art, history, sports, transportation, science - whatever you choose! This is called topical collecting.

Start with used stamps and a few inexpensive accessories (such as a small album and a package of hinges), and you can have a great time on a limited budget. Remember to put stamps, albums and hinges on your birthday and holiday wish lists, too!

If you go on-line to <u>www.usps.com</u> and click on "Buy Stamps & Shop," you'll get all kinds of information like: kinds of stamps, removing stamps from envelopes, how to organize your stamps, info on kinds of stamp albums, how to put stamps in them, what a stamp is worth, judging the condition of stamps, other sources for stamps, other philatelic collectibles and stamp groups to join.

Yes! Stamp clubs can be a great source for new stamps and for stamp collecting advice. These clubs often meet at schools, YMCAs and community centers. You can find out more at the USPS website

#### HISTORICAL SOCIETY HAPPENINGS

Did you know that: Parkman was settled by Robert Parkman in 1804 and his descendants still visit the township? That there were once five churches in Parkman? That there were three separate communities in the township before 1820 (Bundysburg, Little Ireland and Smithville)? That the Post Office was established in 1805 and ten years later had an annual income of only \$10.80? That the upstairs of the Community House was once a roller rink? That the first Amish man to come to Geauga County settled in Parkman and his descendents still live here?

Well, maybe you should know more! In 1797, the Connecticut Land Company sold 17,036 acres of land, in what was known as the Connecticut Western Reserve, to Samuel Parkman, Esq., of Boston, and General Joseph Williams. Thus it began. The rest, as they say, is history - more than 200 years of history and that is what the Parkman Township Historical Society wants to preserve. It reads like a good novel: hardship, romance, murder, comedy, family and tradition.

Help save our history. Memberships are \$10 each, \$30 for a sponsorship or \$250 for a lifetime membership. Membership assures you of future issues of our newsletter which may be compiled into a unique history of Parkman. Imagine someone looking at these in a hundred years and reading about **you!** Also, do you know any tales to be told? Have any artifacts or things of interest to donate or share? We now have our own home (the former home of Mr. & Mrs. Glenn Thompson, and generously donated by the family), which we plan to start restoring soon. And speaking of our new home, we're looking for dedicated volunteers to participate in this grassroots effort. We need donations of time and lots of materials. April 18, 1946 began as any day would for a seven-year-old who was residing with his father, aunt & uncle in Phalanx Station, Ohio, by eating a good breakfast then going out to play with his cousins in the back yard. But

this day was going to be quite different for this boy. His dad was going to marry a long time friend that afternoon. This wedding was going to take place in Parkman, Ohio. The young boy had no idea what changes were going to take place in his life that day.

In the afternoon all the family drove to Parkman for the wedding. It was to be held in the Parkman Congregational church with Rev. John Has-Ellison presiding over the service. The young boy sat with his aunt during the wedding ceremony . As his dad and his new bride walked down the aisle toward the rear of the church his aunt whispered in his ear to say "Hi, Mom." That was the beginning of a new way of life for me.

After the wedding celebration was over, Dad took the family up the street to our new home right next to the elementary school. Boy was I excited to know that I was going to live next to the school with the entire playground equipment close by. It wasn't until toward evening time that I learned that my cousins would not be staying with me and that I was now going to be alone. My joy quickly faded as this is not what I had anticipated. Many tears were shed as I watched my aunt and uncle leave to go home, with my cousins waving out the car window to me. Parkman now had three new residents.

I found that the new home was very nice. I had my own room and could go to the playground to pass time away. Getting adjusted to having a "mom" was new to me and of course she had to learn how to live with a "son" who hardly knew her. It was going to be a long period of adjustment for all in the household.

Being in the second grade I had to go to a new class with new children that did not know me at all. I was a new kid who could not talk very well because of a speech disability known as stuttering. Mrs. Karen Has-Ellison, the wife of the preacher, was my teacher. She quickly realized that I was going to need some help in bonding with my new classmates, so she was very kind in assisting me in this classroom environment.

But, that is another story to continue later.


#### WE HAD SO MUCH FUN, LET'S DO IT AGAIN

And speaking of our ambulance, our new one is here and has been put in service. We've had in-service instruction sessions for all department members to familiarize us with the new layout and features of this beautiful vehicle. It's the first brand-new ambulance Parkman Volunteer Fire Department has ever had.

We started the EMS division back in 1984 with an ambulance purchased from Community Ambulance for \$5000. If only it were still \$5000 for our new one! This brought to mind some of the interesting items from our history that I thought you might enjoy.

The Fire Department was formed in 1945. Prices were much lower then. Records indicate that 12 helmets were purchased for 25¢ each from Republic steel. Helmets are now about \$175 each. In 1947, a fire nozzle was purchased for \$38. The price now is in excess of \$250.

In 1946, a card was sent to all telephone subscribers in Parkman to ask them to desist from using the phone for 10 minutes after the fire siren had been sounded.

Many of you might remember where the old fire station was located. It doesn't seem possible but we moved to the current location back in 1976. In 1977, we had the first three women join our Fire Department. They were Shirley George, Dixie Warner and Elizabeth Komandt. We currently have nine women serving as fire fighters and/or EMS personnel

Your Fire Department has come a long ways since 1945. The training required has multiplied many times over that required then. I would be willing to wager that today's firefighter trains more in two months than the original members trained in two years. Be assured that the current members of your Fire Department are committed to supplying you with the best service possible, and they appreciate your continued support.

As always, if you might be interested in helping the Fire Department as a fire fighter or emergency medical technician, contact any member or stop in on any Wednesday night. Our station is always open to the citizens of Parkman Township.

#### **ZONING COMMISSION BRIEF**

The Parkman Township Zoning Commission approved an amendment to the Parkman Township Zoning Resolution on December 17, 2004. They also held a public meeting on January 24, 2005, for public discussion of the amendment. Changes were made to 401.0 Prohibited Uses In All Zoning Districts that pertain to Adult Oriented Businesses. Article XIV Adult Oriented Businesses was added to the zoning resolution. The new article will require that an adult-oriented business be classified as a conditional use and be located within and subject to the regulations of the industrial zoning district(s). The proposed amendment will be sent to the Township

Trustees for review. They will hold a public meeting on March 7 for open discussion, before they decide to accept or reject the proposed amendment.

A portion of property along State Route 168 is currently zoned industrial. The Zoning Commission has considered changing this district from industrial to residential. If this change is made, the property owners in that area would be limited to the zoning requirements of a residential district and would no longer qualify for consideration in an industrial district. The Zoning Commission will have continued discussion about this matter. Parkman residents and property owners are welcome to attend the meetings.
